
Unique sculpture at Christie's





It was not uncommon for boys, until age 6 or 7, to be dressed like girls and portrayed in their long dresses. After that age, boys started to wear trousers. It explains why many authors see these painted children as girls instead of boys.

Netherlandish painters made many paintings of young children holding colf clubs in their hands in the 16th and 17th centuries.

The rich attire and the often far too big colf clubs (from their fathers) show that the depictions are a kind of 'stately portraits' of rich men's children rather than sporty children. This boy has a club for his size.
