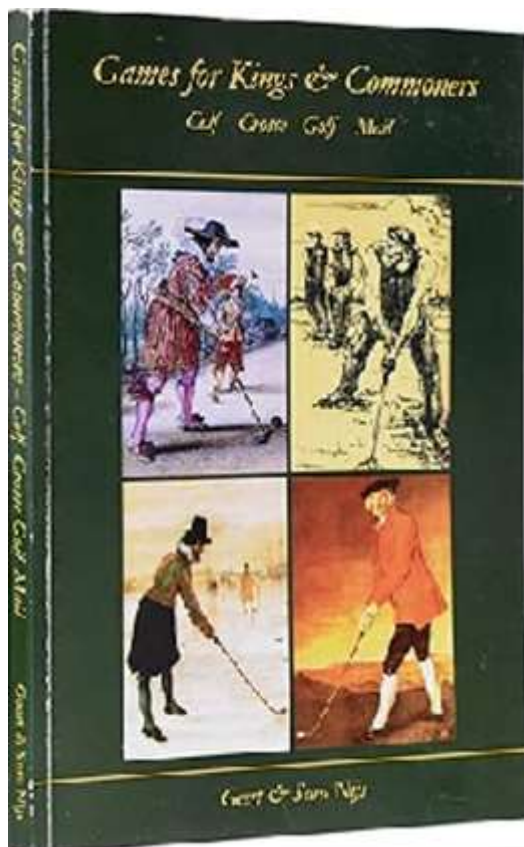


Our books on the internet

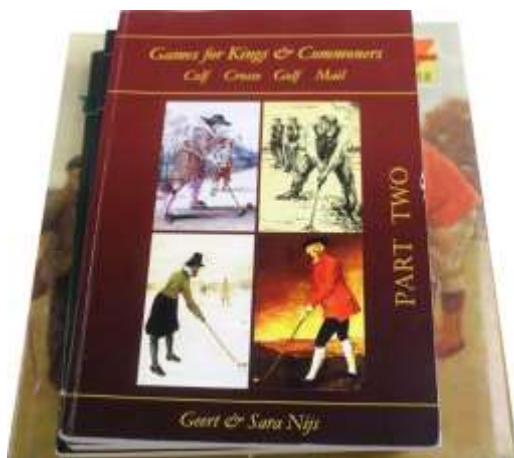


Another example is Fine Golf Books, which sells Part One for £79.

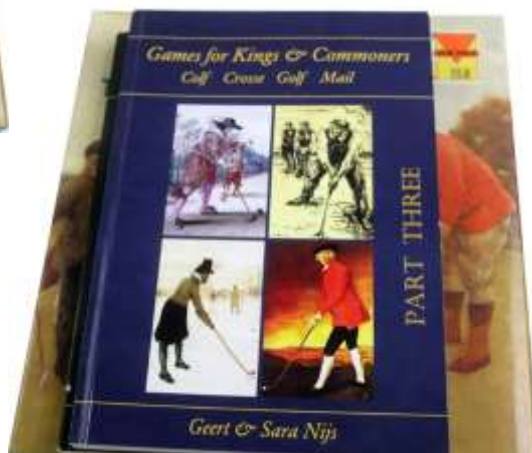
Abebooks asks £92; the seller is Fine Golf Books ...

On the site <https://www.barnebys.fr> I found a copy for €108.

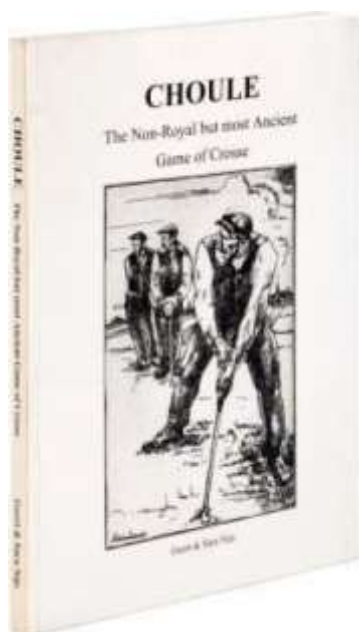
Another thing I discovered is that on <https://www.bookscrolling.com>, our book figures on the list of 'The Best Golf Books Of All-Time'. With Part One, we are at number 93, but all the same. I find it a great compliment!



Apart from a lot of 'Ten (10) Various Golf Books - Club Trademarks, St Andrews, Georgiady & more' sold for \$362 (minimum bid \$70) by <https://www.thegolfauction.com>, I did not find other sales from Part Three & Two. They are exclusively available for purchase from me.



These findings made me curious about 'Choule – The Non-Royal but most Ancient Game of Crosse' (2008). So, I checked for this title as well.



On the site <https://pbagalleries.com>, the book 'Choule – The Non-Royal but most Ancient Game of Crosse' (2008), auctioned in 2021, was sold for \$125.

Mullock Jones Auctioneers & Valuers hammered it in May 2024 for only £10. Underestimated, I would say!
